<u>Amelanchier laevis</u> Allegheny Serviceberry 'cumulis'- single trunk	15' to 25'	15' to 25'	Rounded	N/A	Attractive tree, often must be limbed up to meet requirements, use only single trunk forms
<u>Cercis canadensis</u> Eastern Redbud 'alba' 'Flame' 'Forest Pansy' 'Royal'	20 ' to 25'	20' to 30'	Rounded	N/A	Excellent native tree; graceful ascending branches, normally must be limbed up to meet requirements,; showy pink-purple flowers.
<u>Aesculus cavnes</u> Red Buckeye 'Brioti'					
<u>Cornus alternifolia</u> Pagoda Dogwood	15' to 25'	20' to 30'	Rounded	N/A	Low branched tree or; interesting horizontal branching, must be limbed up to meet requirements
<u>Cornus kousa</u> Kousa Dogwood 'Milky Way'	15' to 20'	15' to 20'	Rounded	N/A	Possible use if limbed up, but naturally develops a low branching structure
<u>Crataegus phaenopyrum</u> Washington Hawthorn	20' to 30'	20' to 25'	Oval to Rounded	4'+	Dens, thorny tree, acceptable as a street tree but thorns can limit use, often must be limbed up
<u>Crataegus viridis</u> Green Hawthorne 'Winter King'	20' to 30'	20' to 30'	Rounded	4'+	Dense thorny tree, v-shaped branching; occasionally must be limbed up; excellent small specimen tree.
<u>Malus</u> (varieties) Crabapple (varieties) 'Bob White' 'Sugar Tyme' 'Harvest Gold' 'Donald Wyman' 'Red Swan' 'Snowdrift' ' White Angel'	10' to 25'	10' to 30'	Varied	3'+	Only disease and insect resistant cultivars are acceptable; possible use depends on branching height; often must be limbed up; valued for foliage; fruit, flowers and variations in size and form.

<u>Acer campestre</u> Hedge Maple	25' to 35'	25' to 35'	Rounded	3'+	Excellent medium-sized tree; useful in areas where space is limited; attractive dark green foliage
<u>Gleditsia triacanthos</u> var. inermis Thornless Honeylocus 'Moriane' 'Shademaster' 'Skyline' 'Sunburst' 'Imperial'	30' to 50'	30' to 50'	Rounded	4'+	Only cultivars are acceptable, cultivars have less disease and insect problems than straight species, provides a light, filtered shade, widely used.
<u>Koelreutaria paniculata</u> Golden-Raintree	30' to 40'	30' to 40'	Rounded	4'+	Beautiful dense tree; tolerates most adverse conditions; excellent late yellow flowers; somewhat weak-wooded but can be used as a street tree.
<u>Ostrya virginiana</u> Hophornbeam	25' to 40'	20' to 30'	Rounded	3'+	Good tree where space is limited, occasionally must be limbed up.
<u>Parrotia persica</u> Persian Parrotia	20' to 40'	15' to 30'	Oval	4'+	Outstanding bark and foliage color; excellent for a variety of uses although not very well known.
<u>Prunus yediensis</u> Yoshino Cherry	20' to 40'	20' to 40'	Rounded	N/A	Outstanding pinkish-white flowers; not common .
<u>Syringa reticulata</u> Japanese Tree Lilac 'Ivory Silk'	20' to 30'	15' to 25'	Oval	3'+	Most trouble-free lilac, spectacular white flower display

Acer rubrum Red Maple 'Armstrong' 'Autumn Blaze' 'Autumn Flame' 'Columnar' 'October Glory' 'Red Sunset'	40' to 60'	40' to 60'	Oval	5'+	Excellent tree but requires room to develop; numerous cultivars are superior to the straight species and should be considered for use.
Acer saccharum Sugar Maple 'Legacey' 'Green Mountain' 'Majesty'	60' to 75'	50' to 60'	Rounded	5'+	One of the best larger shade trees; not for crowded areas.
Betula nigra River Birch	40' to 70'	40' to 60'	Oval to Rounded	N/A	More adaptable and disease resistant than other birch trees; handsome tree; good for wet areas
Cercidiphyllum japonicum Katsura Tree	40' to 60'	30' to 50'	Oval to Columnar	4'+	Extremely variable in spread and form; male forms are narrow and upright while female forms are round and spreading, handsome tree, has to be limbed up
Ginkgo Biloba (Male) Ginkgo 'Autumn Gold' 'Fastigota'	50' to 80'	30' to 50'	Pyramidal to Rounded	5'+	Tolerates adverse condition; excellent tree for streets and other urban areas; outstanding ornamental qualities
Platanus acerifolia London Planetree 'Bloodgood'	60' to 85"	50' to 70'	Pyramidal to oval	5'+	Tolerates dry soil and is resistant to anthracnose that afflicts sycamore. Ornamental patchy bark that ranges from creamy-white to olive green.
Quercus phellos Willow Oak	40' to 60'	40' to 50'	Pyramidal to oval	5'+	Very handsome tree, widely used in south; finer textured than other oaks.
Quercus rubra Red Oak	60' to 75'	40' to 50'	Rounded	5'+	Widely used, fast growing oak; transplants easily; valuable for a variety of landscape uses
Quercus coccinea Scarlet Oak	60' to 75'	40' to 50'	Rounded	5'+	Beautiful red fall leaf color,
Quercus shumardii Shumard Oak	40' to 60'	40' to 50'	Rounded	5'+	Not widely known, native to this area

Sophora japonica Japanese Pagoda 'Regent'	50' to 70'	40' to 60'	Rounded	5'+	Excellent flowers and foliage; last of large trees to glower; adaptable to moist conditions; good tree for a variety of uses.
Tilia cordata Littleleaf Linden 'Chancellor' 'Greenspira' 'June Bride'	60' to 70'	30' to 50'	Oval	5'+	Tough adaptable tree, excellent choice for street or urban use; most popular Linden for landscape.
Tilia Tomentosa Silver Linden	50' to 70'	30' to 50'	Oval to Rounded	5'+	Tolerates heat and drought, better than other Lindens, beautiful ornamental tree
Tilia x euchlora Crimean Linden 'Redmond'	40' to 60'	20' to 30'	Oval	5'+	Best foliage of any Linden, a grafted hybrid
Ulmus parvifolia Lacebark Elm	40' to 50'	40' to 50'	Rounded	5'+	Resistant to Dutch Elm disease, is a superior ornamental tree
Zelkova serrata Japanese Zelkova 'Village Green'	50' to 80'	40' to 70'	Vase- shaped	5'+	Outstanding ornamental tree, has been used as a replacement for American Elm; tolerates wind and drought' excellent street tree.
Nyssa Sylvatica Black Gum	50' to 75'	35' to 50'	Rounded to Pyramidal	8'+	This species is known for its brilliant red Fall color (one of the best) and voted as one of the top 25 trees to plant in Northern Kentucky. Dig in the spring. Abundant blue fruit ripens in Fall.
